Jody Hedlund Continues her Beacons of Hope Series

It's the Upper Peninsula of Michigan in the 1870s and Tessa Taylor's big plans are ruined. Her dreams of starting a new life as a teacher are thrown into Lake Superior along with her quest toward independence. She is allowed to stay through winter and determines she will use the season to prove her value even though the town requested a male teacher. Jody Hedlund delights fans with the third book in her Beacons of Hope series this winter.



Undaunted Hope isn't just a historical novel. It's also packed with romance and intrigue as two men compete for Tessa's heart. Fans who know Jody's writing will recognize Tessa from Jody's book, *Hearts Made Whole*. Jody commented, "In *Hearts Made Whole*, Tessa is spirited and impetuous. In the process of trying to escape from her life at a lighthouse, she makes a terrible mistake that has repercussions that follow her into *Undaunted Hope*. I like to think she finally finds her redemption."

Tessa's search for redemption becomes clear early on as she vows to prove herself indispensable in order to maintain the teaching position for which she was hired. Percival Updegraff, superintendent and chief mine clerk, begrudgingly agrees to allow Tessa to stay through the winter since finding a replacement before then would be impossible. Tessa's students fall in love with her and determine that she is the right fit for their widowed father. However, their uncle has other plans as his affection for Tessa grows.

While the two men compete for Tessa's attention, it becomes apparent to her that everything is not as it seems and someone is charting her every move. When asked about this element

of suspense Jody said, "I always set out to write a stomach-tingling, heart-warming romance! While I don't consider myself a suspense writer, I do always try to have some level of tension and an element of 'unknown' within my novels."

The setting for this book is unique. Unlike the previous novels in the series, this book is set in the Upper Peninsula. Jody had the rare opportunity of doing a lot of on-site research for this book. She actually stayed at the assistant light keeper's house which overlooks Eagle Harbor and Lake Superior. "Every morning I woke up to the sound of the crashing waves and every evening I watched the sunset. It was one of the most beautiful, peaceful places I've ever stayed."

While she was researching, Jody came across the diary of Henry Hobart, an actual schoolteacher in the area during that time. She gleaned much from his experiences and hardships. "I loved reading his diary and learning about all he experienced, especially those unique things that came with being in such a remote area of Michigan and living among the mining community."


Jody says that this story is really one of perseverance. "Just like Tessa, I hope that readers will find the

strength to face their fears. We all have things that frighten us, and many times we find it easier to run away from those things that scare us.” Jody desires for readers to know that God is ever-present during the most difficult times.

“He’s there walking right beside us and He’ll help us come out on the other side stronger as a result.”

Forever Safe, the final book in the Beacons of Hope series is slated to release in June. And Jody did give us a little hint about its protagonist: “The main character in *Forever Safe* does make an appearance at the end of *Undaunted Hope*. I won’t say who it is, so that I don’t spoil the surprise for those who haven’t read *Undaunted Hope*.” **FF**

What are your all-time favorite novels?
Anne of Green Gables was one of my favorites as a child because it played a role in developing my creativity as a writer. (Followed closely by *A Little Princess* and *Little Women* because they also featured strong, creative girls.)

What do you make of the current climate of romance in Christian fiction?

I’m pleased that the Christian romance market is broadening out with what is available. I believe that Christian authors should glorify God with their stories and that means we need to refrain from explicit content. However, I do believe there is a place in the Christian market for a wide variety in the types of romances, everything from sweet to sultry, especially if we hope to meet the diverse tastes of readers.

My stories tend to be on the more sultry side of the romance. Bedroom doors are always closed and clothes always stay on. I want my characters to remain noble and exemplary role models for godly relationships. However, I do manage to weave in a bit of toe-curling romantic tension.

Where We're Headed

A Look at the Direction of Christian Romance

The landscape of Christian publishing has been changing since sales began declining in 2013. However, a few things have remained constant: devoted fans, talented writers and great stories. We're taking a look at where Christian romance is headed and what fans can expect.

NEW PUBLISHERS

Several new publishers have entered the market in the last few years. Some of them are micro-publishers such as Mountainview Books, while others are the products of authors and publishers staking a claim to bolster the industry. Most notably, literary agent Steve Laube purchased Marcher Lord Press in 2014 and rebranded it as Enclave Publishing. Though Enclave doesn't specialize in romance, some of their speculative and sci-fi novels contribute to the genre. Another new publisher on the scene specializing in romance is Ashberry Lane, started in 2013. They've garnered great reviews and are offering opportunities to authors writing stunning stories.

NEW PLOTS

It's no secret some plot lines in Christian romance are overplayed. However, some new books published in 2015 and the beginning of 2016 are attempting to break that mold. For example, Suzanna M. Wolfe's historical romance tells the unlikely and forgotten story of Augustine of Hippo's concubine—a woman whose name has been lost to history. The back cover states, "A tale of womanhood, faith and class at the end of antiquity, *The Confessions of X* is more than historical fiction ... it is a timeless story of love and loss in the shadow of a theological giant."

MORE FROM THE BESTSELLERS

Fans can also look forward to more from their favorite authors. **Beverly Lewis**, **Karen Kingsbury**, **Cindy Woodsmall** and **Wanda Brunstetter** are showing no signs of stopping or slowing. Last year the top authors published over a dozen books and this year Brunstetter already has seven books slated for release!

MORE FROM INDIE AUTHORS

Independent publishing is exploding right now. Not only are indie authors able to capture an audience all on their own, thanks to social media, many authors are becoming “hybrid” authors, pursuing traditional publishing houses while venturing to publish projects on their own. Amazon and Goodreads are wonderful places to discover up-and-coming independent authors. However, some Christian fiction fans feel publishers should remain the “gatekeepers” to this sacred and special genre of fiction. It is clear that independent publishing is only gaining steam thanks to the changing climate in publishing as a whole.

FEW DEBUT AUTHORS

Because publishers are choosier with the books they publish, few debut authors are expected to emerge in the Christian romance genre this year. In an interview with Publishers Weekly last year, Jonathan Merkh, publisher at Howard Books, stated, “We firmly believe in the power of fiction and don’t want to slow down, but we will probably slow down in the acquisition of first-time authors.”

MORE NOVELLA COLLECTIONS

One trend that does not appear to be slowing down is the novella trend. Many authors are publishing novellas as prequels to new projects and offering them for free as eBook downloads. Last year, Zondervan offered a Year of Weddings Novella Collection. Each month had a dedicated novella from an all-star romance author. Packaged separately or by the season, these novellas were a hit with fans. Readers love the flexibility of a novella with the impact of a full novel. **FF**



Can these two from different cultures find a way to be together or will they choose tradition instead of love and happily-ever-after? *Amish Sweethearts* (Bethany House) is everything fans of Amish romance are hoping for this year!



Can you tell us about the inspiration behind the plot in *Amish Sweethearts*?

For the last six years, as I've been writing Amish fiction, my husband was serving in the Army Reserve (30 years total—he just retired!), including as the commander of a field hospital in Afghanistan. Several years ago I thought: What if a military family moved next door to an Amish family? The result was the Neighbors of Lancaster County series. *Amish Sweethearts* focuses on the oldest son, Zane, of the English family and the oldest daughter, Lila, of the Amish family.

What's your spin on this familiar plot of Amish girl meets English boy?

Zane follows in his father's footsteps and joins the Army, even though he knows he's in love with Lila. Meanwhile, Lila, who's committed to remaining Amish and marrying the bishop's son, does her best to deny her love for Zane. Neither one of their families

wants them together—even though it's obvious to all that the two care about each other deeply. The Amish family is non-resistant and pacifist. The English family values military service and loyalty to country. The differences between the two families seem more extreme than ever!

That's the set-up for *Amish Sweethearts*. You'll have to read it to see if Zane and Lila's love can overcome the vast cultural divide between their two backgrounds, or if they're destined to live out their separate lives.

When you need information about the Amish, where do you turn to?

I'm always reading about the Amish: scholarly books, biographies, autobiographies, blog posts, cookbooks, *The Budget* (a Plain newspaper), and other sources. I also have a good friend who grew up Amish, and she graciously answers my questions and reads my manuscripts in their early stages. I

also have several contacts, both Amish and Mennonite, in Lancaster County and other Amish communities who answer specific questions that I have. I'm so grateful for all of these sources; I wouldn't be writing fiction about the Amish without them.

You've been writing for over a decade now ... can you share some of your best writing tips?


Yes, my first novel was published 13 years ago, but I wrote fiction for a decade before being offered my first novel contract. So, wow! I've been at this a long time!

My advice is to write, write and write! Don't wait for the confidence

or the skills. Both will come in time. Learning to write is a lifelong process.

When you're not writing, read books about writing fiction and also read good fiction to see how other authors do it. Also, join a writers' group, which will give you A) deadlines, B) feedback and C) a community of people who understand all your quirks—yes, every writer has them!

My other piece of advice is to write fast and furious on the first draft. Get it done! Then begin the rewriting process. If you're the kind of person who writes clean and slow and finishes your manuscripts, disregard this advice. But if you tinker and tinker and tinker and never finish a manuscript, this advice is for you.




Do you have more books planned for your *Neighbors of Lancaster County* series?

Beloved author Susan May Warren is continuing her Christiansen Family series with another stunning novel. Each book in the series is dedicated to telling one family member's story. *You're the One that I Want* (Tyndale House) details Owen Christiansen's story. The black sheep of the family is finally taking center stage and Susan answered all our questions about this release.



Can you tell us a bit about Owen and how he ended up on a crabbing boat?

Oh, Owen. The troubled child. The man who watched his dreams slip through his fingers when his hockey career was destroyed. The reckless brother, the prodigal son. His story is a long time coming ... and I saved the best for last. After the family fight (a literal fist-fight with his brother), Owen has vanished, making his way through Montana (working for the Jude County Hotshots) and then over to Seattle, where he got wind of a job and traveled north, to Alaska, to work on the fishing boats. He's signed onto the Wilhemina, a crabbing boat whose first mate is Scotty McFlynn.

Scotty is Owen's love interest in this novel. What makes her an intriguing character?

Scotty has grown up as the only child of a salty fisherman, in the harsh world of crab fishing, and the

Alaskan wilderness. She's a tough, smart cop/detective on leave from the department after an event that left her rattled. Her stint as first mate on her father's boat is short-term, but long enough to meet Owen Christiansen, who seems to like her. She's used to men's attention—after all, she's often been the only girl on a crew of men—but she's used to rebuffing them. But Owen is different ... especially when he saves her life.

If you had to describe the series in a few sentences, what would you say?

It's a series about family, faith and real life. There are no soft answers, and it's filled with real emotions, conflict, drama and truth.

How have fans received this series so far?

I've been overwhelmed with the fantastic response. Readers have compared it to Karen Kingsbury's

Are there other books planned for this series?

Not at this time.


Do you have any ideas for future novels or are they already in process?

Oh, for sure! I love this family and will miss them, but I think readers will really love the ending. I cried ... but am thankful to have known them and written their stories!

Robin Lee Hatcher's latest release, *Keeper of the Stars* (Thomas Nelson) continues her Kings Meadow Romance story. Robin sat down to answer our questions about this book, her inspiration and the secret to writing pulse-pounding romance!



Your main character, Penny, is grieving over the loss of her brother. What was it like to write a character dealing with such a profound loss?

Through the years, I have written about many types of profound loss. This story wasn't any more or less difficult to write, from the author's perspective. It helps, I suppose, that my writing process allows the characters to tell their own stories rather than me trying to force something to happen or force them to experience a certain emotion. The emotions they feel are theirs, not mine. While I empathize with my characters, I do not put myself in their places.

Where did the inspiration for this plot come from?

Some stories begin with a memorable spark. This wasn't one of those books. To be honest, it began with a desire for a change of seasons. My two previous novels in the Kings Meadow Romance series (*Love Without End* and *Whenever You Come Around*), plus my novella in the Year of Weddings series that is also

set in Kings Meadow (*I Hope You Dance*), all took place during the summer. It was time for this mountainous area to experience something other than sunny and warm weather. And since *Keeper of the Stars* was set to release in January, I chose winter and snow! Soon after that decision was made, I envisioned a cold, windy day in a cemetery (later that had to change to September for purposes of the story), and from there the premise for the novel began to unfurl in my mind. Finally, I stumbled upon the image of the couple that ultimately became the cover for this book, and Penny and Trevor came to life in my imagination.

I try not to analyze my creative process because much of it is a mystery, taking place deep inside of me.

Penny's love interest in the book is also the person she blames for her brother's death. Yet, the two still have an attraction to one another. Is this what makes this love story so good?

Yes, I believe that is true. Not every great romance begins with an

immediate and obvious attraction. Both Penny and Trevor needed to heal, to forgive and be forgiven, before they could open their hearts to love. Watching them go through the process is what keeps readers turning the pages, I believe.

All fans of romance fiction know that the hero and heroine will get together in the end. The pleasure in reading a romance (which can be a very different thing from a “love story”) comes from discovering how those characters overcome the problems thrown into their lives, problems that threaten to keep them apart. When an author does her job well, she can even make a reader wonder if there is any hope that the characters can overcome, even while being certain they will.

What's your secret to writing engaging romance plots that aren't overplayed?

Harking back to one of my previous answers, it's all about my characters

and letting them tell me their stories. Even in books where I draw heavily on experiences in my own life the protagonists are not me. A Promise Kept was a very personal story, but Allison was not Robin. She was simply Allison. I allowed her to tell me her story. I allowed her to feel and think for herself. My novels are character-driven, not plot-driven, so the characters take me where they want to go. Because they are such real individuals in my mind and heart, I believe that makes even overplayed plots feel fresh.


How was this project different from your previous novels?

I have written over 75 novels and novellas. Each is unique, yet the writing process is pretty much the same from book to book.

Will you be writing more books in your Kings Meadow Romance series?



However, at present I'm writing a novel with a new setting, this time in a small town near the Snake River in southwestern Idaho. I hope readers will become as fond of this new setting and of those who live there as they were of Kings Meadow.

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


time was up.


And my family. My six-month-old niece who adds a new trick to her baby repertoire every week ... will I ever see her again? The
